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#### On Cloud 9 For GCSE Results

Students and staff celebrated their GCSE results in August, with students enjoying some significant success.

Amongst those celebrating – and who achieved the highest grade 9 –

- · Gavin Rajesh, who achieved six grade 9s and two grade 8s;
- · Yugo Tsukagoshi, who achieved four grade 9s, two grade 8s, a Level 2 Distinction\* and was awarded 100% in each of his maths papers, as well as 98% in Combined Science.
- · Riya Lobo, who achieved two grade 9s, four grade 8s and three grade 7s;
- · Isobel Hurst, who achieved one grade 9, five grade 8s, two grade 7s and a Level 2 Distinction\*;
- · Harvey Edwards, who achieved one Grade 9, six grade 8s and two grade 7s;
- · Lydia Morris, who achieved one grade 9, one grade 8, one grade 8-8 in combined science, four grade 7s and one grade 6.



"We have had a fantastic week with this outstanding group of young people, and we can't wait for them to join us properly at the start of term."










