took to the camera to present over 200 awards during the half an hour event, which was premiered on our YouTube channel on Friday 16th July.

Among the award winners were six Year 11 students who were recognised for achieving five years 100% attendance and presented with either an iPad or laptop to support their future studies.

Other prizes included form effort and attainment, subject awards, head of year awards and Future Me awards, the latter recognising students who went the extra mile to contribute to school life outside of the curriculum.

All students who won were sent an invite and a commemorative programme in the post to keep as a memento, and they will be presented with their trophies in school at the start of next term.

Year 10 students enjoyed a university-style graduation ceremony after completing the school's Scholar's Programme.

The group have been working on university-level work since October as part of

Brilliant Club, with a specific focus on Digital Capitalism and Modern Society.

During this time, they have enjoyed working with their own university PhD mentor from Manchester Metropolitan University who is researching Digital Politics - specifically, global digital capitalism, imperialism, and Africa. The research interrogates the histories of economic systems (from feudal times to the present), empires, and their relationship to the current geopolitics of

technology. Students have had the opportunity to explore these concepts with their tutor, while completing assignments alongside their own GCSE work in school.

Students attended a virtual graduation ceremony where they received certificates and even enjoyed the traditional throwing of their graduation mortar boards to celebrate completion of the course.

Assistant Principal Mrs Milnes said: "I am so proud of all the students who have completed this programme and they fully deserve the recognition they have received for their perseverance, resilience and determination to stretch themselves.

"I would like to thank Greater Manchester Higher for supporting us with Brilliant Club – it has offered our students an invaluable insight into higher education and has given them a real enthusiasm to continue their studies into university and beyond."

BIG Award!

Stockport Academy's anti-bullying programme has been recognised nationally for the FIFTH year, after it picked up another Bullying Intervention Group (BIG) Award.

We are proud to be the only school in Stockport to hold the honour.

Judges were particularly impressed by our peer mentor programme, which sees older students take an active role in welcoming new students into the classroom and offer them individual support if they feel they might be struggling with any aspect of adapting to life at the academy.

Mrs McCann, Stockport Academy Principal, said: "We are delighted to receive this award again in recognition of our zero tolerance approach to bullying in school. Our students' wellbeing and happiness is at the heart of everything we do at Stockport Academy and it is so important to us that they feel safe and secure in their learning environment."


In between ice-breakers and treasure hunts to help them find their way around the building, they also had to chance to try out activities such as cooking, dodgeball, archery and comic book writing.

Author Inspires Young Writers

Our Year 7 students were treated to a writing masterclass with an author who has penned over 230 books during his career.

Steve Skidmore spent the day in our library leading a series of workshops to inspire and inform our youngest cohort, and sessions covered a wide range of topics, including the necessity for writers to borrow and reshape their ideas from other works; making sure to match characters with the theme and setting of their fictional worlds; and creating tension by applying the Magic 3 for character development (the set up – repetition or development – the resolution) before moving on to discuss both the techniques of foreshadowing and the use of conflict to pique a reader's interest.

Librarian Mr Clarke said: "Our students were treated to a writing masterclass, which was structured to not only benefit students' future writing endeavours, but also, and perhaps more importantly, to bring students a little bit of joy after a challenging year. Throughout, students were encouraged to engage and provide imaginative solutions to fantastical problems of every kind, every step of the way. To say they left feeling capable of writing the next great classic would be something of an understatement!"





Mental Health Awareness Week

Students and staff celebrated Mental Health Awareness Week by sharing their love for the great outdoors.

This year's event was themed around nature – and how people can make the most of it to support their wellbeing.

In school, students were encouraged to take part in a gratitude challenge that involved them writing down or drawing what they liked best about nature, while form groups also competed to see how many students could walk or cycle to school instead of coming in the car.

Meanwhile, our school counsellor held some of her sessions outside – which went down brilliantly with students.

One Year 10 said: "Now we are back at school, I feel we spend a lot of time in the classroom so it has been nice to walk outside and get some fresh air. I have found it relieving and relaxing being outside for the eco sessions. Being out in nature,

hearing the birds, seeing the trees has definitely improved my mood."

A Year 11 student added: "Walking in nature makes me feel relaxed and calm. It grounds me back to reality. All my worries seem to lessen as I am in nature. I focus on the different bird sounds and the water trickling, it is really calming. I found this has helped me in school as Michelle the counsellor understands as it calms my nerves."

Our school paid tribute to the lives lost during the Manchester Arena terror attack with a moving remembrance ceremony.

Students sat down to form a giant bee in the middle of the Atrium as the service began, while others lined the corridors on the first and second floors.

After observing a minute's silence, our SA Dance group put on a wonderfully-choreographed piece, before Eden in Year 9 sang in front of the audience. As she performed, students dropped hundreds of paper bees onto the floor, each one with a handwritten message of reflection from students.

Towards the end of term, a group of our students who have been completing their Duke of Edinburgh (DofE) Silver and Bronze awards this year.

The awards were achieved through a five -day expedition that

started at Bredbury Hall and ended at Errwood & Fernilee Reservoir in Whaley Bridge. Students were responsible for not only planning the route, but also navigating terrain as a team and setting up camp each night until they reached their destination.

Year 10 student and newly-appointed Head of the Prefectural Board Ewan Harkness wrote this report about his experience:

This term, some Year 10 students, including myself, finished their DofE Bronze and Silver awards by completing an expedition.

The expeditions were 10km treks going through hills, under bridges and next to rivers. Navigation was completed by the student team, and members of staff were positioned at check points along the way, so if you got lost you had to figure it out yourself.

However, before the expedition even began, months of time and effort had to be put in by the participants. This was because in order to receive the award, you have to complete three sections: skill, physical and volunteering. For two of those activities, three months of tasks and prep had to be completed for each and then six months for the final activity.

Everyone who completed the awards

have learned new skills, become physically fitter and, volunteered for a staff supported Year 10 charity. We all say that we will continue with these hobbies after the award has been completed.

> After completing the DofE Bronze and Silver awards, we reflected on the journey to this point, which was made more difficult by the impact of lockdown and Covid-19, and we all felt great pride at what we achieved.

I would urge everyone to take part in DofE as it is incredibly rewarding, fun and everyone who took part enjoyed it greatly.
