Other favourites included: Problem Solving, Shelter Building, Jacob's Ladder, Archery and the Night Line.

Showcase, which he performed for our own students in addition to Year 5 pupils from Cheadle Heath, St **Matthews and Lark Hill** primary schools. Elsewhere, students had the chance to get involved in a lung dissection with Mrs Staniforth in an extra-special after-school Science Club, as well as dye their own flowers through the process of transpiration.

In STEM Club, students participated in the Royal Society of Chemistry's 'Take

Charge' global experiment, that involved them making their own batteries. Every form group also took part in a BSW Quiz, before we ended the week with a co-curricular escape room that involved students having to solve Science-based riddles in order to complete the task. Head of Science Mr Campbell said: "Students really loved getting involved in the interactive elements of British Science Week and it was great to see so many enjoying learning about the subject."

World Book Day

Students and staff celebrated World Book Day with a range of activities across the school. **Every student was encouraged** to submit their own book reviews, with all reviews going into a prize draw. In every lesson, each class

Driving Eco Change

Our students have secured funding to encourage a sustainable travel into school. The Youth Travel Ambassadors are a team of eight students in Years 7-10 who have volunteered to be part of a project for promoting sustainable methods of transport to the Academy. Working with Transport for **Greater Manchester, students** to help them plan and carry out research to look at how our students travel to school.

Through assemblies, form-time surveys and online forms, they gathered information that shows that over 25% of our students are brought to school by car - and the team decided that their project emphasis would be to encourage more students to walk to school. Having agreed on a project they pitched to the TfGM **Dragons Den panel on 10th** have had a series of workshops March and were awarded £500 to use in delivering the project.

The 'Walk More - Breathe Better' campaign will start in May and will last for a month. After this period, the team will evaluate any changes in the numbers of students walking to school and will present their findings at a TfGM celebration event in July.



Talking Politics

Our Student Council hosted two Stockport councillors as they explored local politics as a career option.

Cllr Georgia Lynott & Cllr Louise Heywood spent several hours with the group, answering questions about the impact that councillors are able to make to their area and how they got involved in the role.

They were given a tour of our facilities by the students,

before enjoying a working lunch where they discussed issues that students felt were important to **Edgeley and Cheadle Heath,** including transport and housing. **Assistant Principal Mrs Milnes,** who leads the Student Council, said: "Our Student Council were really engaged by the visit and loved hearing about how they could potentially make a difference to the world around them while pursuing a career path that really interests them.

"I would like to thank both of the councillors for their time with us today, which provided students with an invaluable insight into what a councillor does and how aspiring young people can become one."

Students enjoyed an actionpacked day around campus, meeting some of Oxford's student ambassadors so they could hear first-hand what it is like to learn at this legendary institution.

choices, before taking part in an academic session that enabled them to get a taste of a real life degree-level seminar. The ambassadors also offered a half-hour tour of the campus itself before indulging in a Q&A session that gave our students one final opportunity to find out anything they wanted to know before getting on the bus back to Stockport Academy.

The group showcased their blossoming business Y.E.S Colouring – specifically a wellbeing-focused colouring book.

During the event, which was hosted at University Campus 92 in Trafford, the team manned a stall that informed visitors of their journey so far, before being quizzed by judges on their business plan.

The panel commended them on their resilience and teamwork, commenting that it was highly impressive they'd managed to raise £450 in profit through fundraisers to help launch



their product.

Business Teacher Mr Lewis, who runs our Young Enterprise cocurricular club, said: "I am so proud of the team and everything they have achieved while learning all about the rigours of running their own business.

"They have grown so much throughout the process and this has been a valuable experience that I am sure they will take with them for many years to come."

A Day At The Beach

Our Year 11 Geographers had the opportunity to carry out their own fieldwork as part of their GCSE studies during a trip to Cleveleys and Blackpool.

The group spent the day on the coast, gathering data on Unit 3 of their Geography coursework, looking at the impact of tourism in the local area and measuring groyne height on the beach. Geography Lead Mrs Finley said: "This trip was a great experience for our students, not only to help them with their studies, but also to give them the opportunity to find out a bit more about how this fascinating subject can be developed into a career."

Sporting Ambition

A group of our Year 7s took their first steps to a career in sports coaching after spending two days taking part in a specialised course with Manchester United Foundation.

The students worked hard to achieve the UK Level 1 Sports Leadership qualification with MUF, participating in theory and practical sessions to complete their studies. They completed sports leader booklets and learning about session planning, before delivering their own session plans alongside other students from MUF partner schools.

As every single one of our students successfully completed the course, they were treated to a visit to the Manchester United museum and a tour of Old Trafford.

Mr Bramley, our MUF Partnership Officer said: "This has been an amazing introduction for our students to the world of sports coaching and it was a fantastic opportunity for everyone involved. "They all took full advantage of this and have come away with a valuable qualification that sets them on a really exciting path for their future."
