secondary school.



Elsewhere, students had the chance to take part in a number of Science afterschool clubs during the week, including Physics Club, where they could create their own hovercraft from CDs and bottle tops before racing them, experience static electricity through a Van de Graaf generator and also watch soundwaves through an oscillator. Other activities included a VR workshop, where students wore virtual reality headsets to see what it would be like to explore space.

In the library, Mr Clarke made a special display of his favourite Science-themed books.

At the end of the week, Head of Science Mr Campbell put on two live Science demonstrations with local primary schools invited to the second showing. Year 5 students from St Matthews' and Alexandra Park primaries enjoyed the 20-minute display that included lots of explosions and weird and wonderful experiments!
