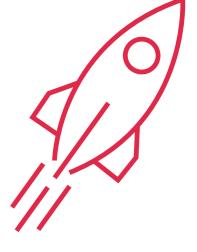

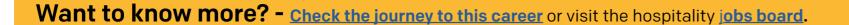

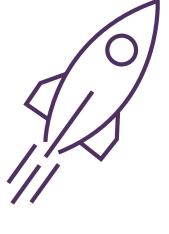

Workplace trends

- National Skills Academy for Rail (NSAR) outlines that skill shortages are set to escalate. Up to 120,000 additional people will be required in the sector over the next five to ten years. Between 7,000 and 12,000 additional people will be needed every year by the industry.
- Employers in the sector often take special steps to attract female and ethnic minority workers to jobs.
- Employers often cluster in Manchester City Centre, Trafford, Wigan, Salford and areas close to rail links.
- Ageing workforce and Brexit leave increasing openings for fresh entries to the sector.
- Advanced Technology High Speed Two (HS2) programme.
- The largest skills gaps are in engineering, specifically railway design and assurance, but in other areas of civil engineering too.
