From Year 9 onwards, you'll have regular opportunities to think about your future - take full advantage! Ask questions, get advice, and explore all the routes open to you.

Things to consider:

- (?) How do you learn best? (classroom, practical, hands-on?)
- (?) What careers interest you? Research what qualifications they need.
- ? Thinking about university? Check entry requirements early.
- (?) What are your strengths, hobbies and talents?
- ? Considering apprenticeships or vocational courses? See what's available.
- (?) Visit open days to get a feel for different providers and facilities on offer.





Changes to GCSEs

GCSEs are now graded 9 to 1 (not A* to G).

- Grade 4 = standard pass (minimum to avoid re-taking English & Maths)
- Grade 5+ = strong pass
- Some courses require Grade 6 or higher to study at post-16

- More challenging content and new topics
- Final exams at the end of Year 11 (not modular)
- Less coursework, except in practical subjects like drama
- ? Foundation and higher tiers now only for Maths, Sciences and Languages

QUALIFICATIONS Explained

Qualifications are organised into different levels. Each level shows how advanced your learning is and what you can progress onto next.

Entry Level qualifications are the starting point, split into three sub-levels (Entry 1, 2 and 3). Anyone can take them, and they're designed to build confidence and skills before moving on. By Entry Level 3, you'll be ready to step up to a Level 1 or 2 course.



At **Level 1**, you'll gain a foundation of knowledge and practical skills. This level acts as a springboard to the next stage of study.



From there, **Level 2** qualifications go further, showing you have a solid grasp of your subject. They're often required for entry into many job roles and usually need either lower GCSE grades (3–1) or a Level 1 qualification as a starting point.



Level 3 takes things deeper, giving you the skills and knowledge needed for higher education. With good GCSE passes (9–4) or a Level 2 qualification, you can move onto A-Levels, T-Levels, or other advanced courses.

Beyond that, Levels 4 to 8 cover specialist and degree-level learning, from foundation degrees through to bachelor's, master's and even doctoral qualifications. Each stage is another step in developing your expertise.

FURTHER Education

Further Education (FE) is what you move on to after Year 11, before higher education such as university.

Most students take this route between the ages of 16 and 19, and it's delivered in different settings – from school sixth forms and sixth form colleges to larger FE colleges.

FE covers two main types of study.

- Academic qualifications, like A-Levels, focus on subjects in depth and are mainly classroom-based, with exams at the end.
- Vocational qualifications, like apprenticeships are designed to prepare you for specific careers.
 These are more practical and hands-on, often blending classroom learning with work experience, coursework, and projects.

There isn't a right or wrong choice – only the choice that works for you. Some subjects can even be studied in both ways, so you might take a purely academic route, a more vocational path, or a mix of the two.



Education after 16 is about shaping your future in a way that works best for you – whether that's in the classroom, hands-on, or a bit of both.

Studying A-LEVELS



A-Levels (Advanced Levels) are subject-based qualifications usually studied over two years. They give you the chance to continue with subjects you enjoyed at GCSE or branch out into something completely new.


Across the two years, you'll deepen your knowledge, sharpen your critical thinking, and develop transferable skills that universities and employers really value.

Assessments mainly happen at the end of the second year, and results are graded from A* to E.

When choosing your subjects, it's worth knowing about "facilitating subjects". These are subjects that many universities prefer or require for a wide range of degree courses – so they help to keep your options open.

Examples include sciences (Biology, Chemistry, Physics), English Literature, Maths and Further Maths, History, Geography, and modern or classical languages.

If you're not sure what you want to study later on, picking at least one facilitating subject alongside your interests can give you more flexibility for the future.





13 Studying T-LEVELS



T-Levels (Technical Levels) are a newer type of qualification, designed for students who already have a good idea of the kind of career they want to move into. Like A-Levels, they are Level 3 courses studied over two years – but the focus is much more practical.

Each T-Level is equivalent to three A-Levels. You'll spend about 80% of your time in the classroom learning technical knowledge and 20% on a substantial work placement. That means at least 315 hours (around 45 days) in industry, giving you real-world experience and the chance to put your skills into practice.

T-Levels were developed with employers, so what you study directly matches the skills that industries need. They're recognised by universities and training providers, but especially valued by employers as preparation for specific careers.







Vocational qualifications are practical, work-based courses designed to give you the skills and knowledge for a specific career. They're a great choice if you learn best by doing, as they combine classroom study with hands-on practice and often include work experience.

LEARN MORE

Courses are available at every level – from Entry through to advanced – and the length of study depends on the level you choose. Subjects are wideranging, from Health and Social Care to Engineering, Animal Care, IT, Media, Logistics, Retail, Beauty Therapy and more.

Level 1 Courses

At Level 1, vocational courses introduce you to the basics of a subject area and help you build confidence. They're a good stepping stone into Level 2 qualifications or apprenticeships. Some providers also offer courses in Employability Skills, designed to prepare you for the world of work.

Level 2 Courses

At Level 2, vocational courses provide deeper knowledge and practical skills in areas such as Art and Design, Creative Media, Business, IT, and Health and Social Care. They can lead directly into employment, further study, or apprenticeships.



Level 3 Courses

Level 3 vocational courses, sometimes called Applied General Qualifications, are designed for students who want to focus on a particular industry while keeping doors open to higher education. Popular options include arts and media, business, crafts, technology and publishing.

Two of the most common qualifications at this level are:

- BTECs These are widely recognised and come in many subjects. They blend theory and practice, often assessed through projects, assignments, and practical tasks.
- NVQs (National Vocational Qualifications) – Ideal if you want to combine working and learning.
 NVQs are based on industry standards, meaning you'll train and be assessed on the skills employers say you need for that job.



ALTERNATIVEStudy

Alongside (or instead of) A-Levels, T-Levels or vocational courses, there are other qualifications you might consider. These can be taken at school, college, sixth form or through independent training providers.

GCSEs

You may be able to re-sit Maths or English if you didn't get the grade you were aiming for, or take additional GCSEs to deepen your subject knowledge. GCSEs remain highly valued by schools, colleges and employers.

Entry Levels

There are over 100 Entry Level certificates, including core subjects like English, Maths and Science. These are broken down into smaller units, assessed through a mix of exams, written tasks, oral presentations or practical activities.

Technical Baccalaureate

Launched by City & Guilds in 2014, the TechBac is aimed at 16–19 year olds who want practical qualifications combined with workplace skills. It's designed to make students "work ready", covering both technical training and soft skills that employers value. Courses can range from 360 hours at Level 2 to over 1,000 hours for advanced study.

Greater Manchester Baccalaureate

A new initiative co-designed by education and business leaders, the MBacc aims to transform technical education across Greater Manchester. It provides a clear route from school to high-quality jobs in the city-region's growing economy, helping young people connect their studies directly with future career opportunities.

Studying an APPRENTICESHIP

An apprenticeship lets you learn on the job while you earn. You'll be employed, paid a real wage, and work towards a nationally recognised qualification – all at the same time. There are over 1,500 apprenticeship roles available, in industries ranging from Business and Media to Construction, Engineering, Health, IT and more.

As an apprentice, you'll usually work at least 30 hours a week. Around 80% of your time will be spent gaining real work experience with your employer, and the other 20% will be dedicated to study. Training is delivered through a college, training provider or university – either at your workplace, on campus, or even online.

Apprenticeships last a minimum of 12 months, though many take longer depending on the level and sector. Along the way, you'll be assessed on your progress and supported to develop the skills employers need. If you haven't yet achieved GCSE English or Maths at grade 9–4 (A*–C), you'll also work towards these as part of your programme.

If you have an Education Health and Care Plan (EHCP), you can keep it during your apprenticeship, and it will continue to be reviewed.






APPRENTICESHIP LEVELS

Apprenticeships are available at different levels, so there's something to suit everyone.

- Intermediate Apprenticeships (Level 2) are a great starting point if you're new to a sector. They help you learn the basics and build experience.
- Advanced Apprenticeships (Level 3) take you deeper, often equivalent to A-Levels.



Higher Apprenticeships (Levels 4–5) and Degree Apprenticeships (Levels 6–7) give you the chance to gain specialist knowledge – even a full degree – while continuing to work and earn.

It's important to check entry requirements before applying. If you don't yet have the qualifications or experience for a higher-level apprenticeship, you can start at a lower level and work your way up.

HOW TO APPLY

Applying for an apprenticeship is similar to applying for a job. You'll need to complete an application form and may be invited to an interview. Opportunities are advertised throughout the year, so it's worth checking regularly. You can search and apply online at:

20 Higher & Degree APPRENTICESHIPS

Higher and Degree Apprenticeships give you the chance to gain advanced qualifications while working and earning a salary. They're a real alternative to university – combining professional training, academic study and on-the-job experience.

Higher Apprenticeships are offered at Levels 4–7. Levels 4 and 5 are equivalent to a Higher Education Certificate, Diploma or a Foundation Degree, while Degree Apprenticeships at Levels 6 and 7 let you work towards a full Bachelor's or Master's degree.

More than 40 different subject areas are available, covering hundreds of roles in industries like business, accounting, construction management, and digital services. For Degree Apprenticeships, part of your training and assessment will usually be delivered by a university or higher education provider, so you may spend some of your time on campus.

Applications are made in the same way as other apprenticeships, via the government's apprenticeship website. You can also find Degree Apprenticeship opportunities through universities themselves or the UCAS website.





SENDProvision

If you have an Education,
Health and Care (EHC) Plan,

At 16, you can stay in full-time education at a mainstream or special sixth form or college, or combine volunteering or work with part-time study. Alongside academic options (A-Levels, T-Levels) and vocational routes (BTECs, Apprenticeships), you could also take part in a Supported Internship.



Supported Internships

These are structured programmes designed for young people with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND). They usually last a year and include a six-month unpaid work placement with a local employer, alongside classroom learning and extra support in English and Maths if needed. Supported Internships help you gain confidence, experience and skills for future employment. Download the Supported Internship booklet for more information.



Local Offer

Stockport's Local Offer website brings together information about services and opportunities for young people with SEND and their families. It covers education and training routes, as well as health, care and support options in the local area.

HIGHER Education



Higher Education (HE) is study beyond the age of 18. UK universities and colleges offer a huge range of courses and qualifications, recognised by employers and academics all over the world.

Because HE courses are often competitive, you'll usually need good grades (often at least GCSE grade 5 in English and Maths), plus relevant experience can also give you an advantage.

HNCs & HNDs

Higher National Certificates (Level 4) and Higher National Diplomas (Level 5) are work-related qualifications designed to develop practical, career-focused skills. They are often delivered by further and higher education colleges. Both are valued by employers and can also provide a pathway into the later years of a degree course.

Foundation Degrees

Equivalent to the first two years of a Bachelor's Degree, Foundation Degrees combine academic learning with vocational skills. They usually take two years full-time (longer part-time) and are designed for students who want a clear link between study and employment.

The most common undergraduate qualification, a Bachelor's Degree usually takes 3-4 years full-time. With thousands of courses to choose from, it's the broadest and most flexible HE option.

- BA (Bachelor of Arts) often linked to humanities, languages, arts and social sciences
- BSc (Bachelor of Science) often linked to sciences, maths, engineering and technology

Some specialist degrees (such as medicine or architecture) take longer to complete.



POSTGRADUATE Study

After completing a Bachelor's Degree, you may choose to progress further with postgraduate qualifications:

- PGCert / PGDip (Postgraduate Certificates & Diplomas) - Shorter than a Master's and focused on advanced skills in a specific area.
- Master's Degree (MA/MSc) Usually 1–2 years fulltime or up to 4 years part-time. Can be taught (lectures and seminars) or research-based.
- Doctorate (PhD) The highest academic qualification. You'll carry out independent research and write a thesis that makes an original contribution to your subject. Full-time PhDs usually take 3-4 years.





If the career you want needs a degree-level qualification, you'll probably be applying to university or considering a Higher or Degree Apprenticeship. That means it's worth thinking early about what subjects, grades and qualifications you'll need to get there.

UCAS Tariff points are a way of turning your grades into a numerical score. Each qualification and grade is given a value – for example, higher grades and higher-level qualifications carry more points. Universities and Higher Education providers use these points to help decide if you meet the entry requirements for a course.

Not every qualification has a UCAS points value, and not every course uses them, so it's always important to check the entry requirements carefully. Some universities may ask for UCAS points, others may just specify certain subjects or grades.



Work **EXPERIENCE**

Work experience is one of the best ways to prepare for the world of work. Whether it's a short placement, a longer internship, or voluntary work, employers always value the experience you've gained in real workplaces.

It can boost your confidence, give you a sense of what it's like to be "work ready," and help you start building useful contacts for the future.

Sometimes, it's the experience that helps you decide what you do (or don't) want to do as a career.



FINDING A WORK PLACEMENT

The first step is to think about the types of jobs or careers that interest you. If a particular course or qualification requires workplace experience, make sure you check this early so you can plan ahead. There are different ways to find opportunities:

- Through advice services Careers advisers and local organisations in Stockport often know of placements and can connect you with employers. (See the Useful Contacts page for details.)
- By approaching employers directly Look up companies you're interested in, then send an email or covering letter to introduce yourself. Be clear about the type of experience you're looking for, why you've chosen them, and what you can bring to their team. A polite follow-up call can also help.



Many students choose to take on a part-time job alongside their studies. As long as it doesn't interfere with school or college, it's a great way to earn money, gain experience, and add valuable skills to your CV.



Even if your part-time role isn't directly linked to your future career, you'll still learn transferable skills such as teamwork, communication and time management. Popular choices for students include retail, hospitality, catering, leisure and administration roles.

EMPLOYMENT & VOLUNTEERING

You can be employed, self-employed or volunteer from 16, as long as you combine it with learning. That means working or volunteering at least 20 hours a week and completing 280 hours of accredited training a year.

If you're interested in volunteering, you can explore opportunities through the <u>Stockport Volunteer</u> <u>Hub</u>. It lists local roles across lots of different areas – from web design, events and youth work to sports coaching, social media, retail or even presenting on community radio. Volunteering is a great way to build confidence, develop new skills, and gain experience that employers really value.





WHERE to study





SIXTH FORMS & SIXTH FORM COLLEGES

Sixth forms are often part of a secondary school, so you may already know the teachers and environment. They usually focus on A-Levels and some BTECs, with a more structured, school-like setting.

Sixth form colleges are larger, only for students aged 16+, and offer a wider mix of courses. The atmosphere is often more independent and "grown-up," closer to what you'd expect at university.

COLLEGES

Colleges provide the broadest range of courses, from A-Levels to vocational qualifications at all levels. You'll often have a more flexible timetable, wear your own clothes, and learn alongside students of all ages. Colleges are usually bigger and more varied, with tutors who combine teaching with real industry experience.





TRAINING PROVIDERS

Training providers specialise in vocational and professional courses such as apprenticeships, traineeships, and study programmes. Learning can take place in a centre, online, in the workplace, or a mix of all three. You'll usually have a personal tutor, but also more independence in how and where you study.
