A group of our students took part in a special virtual event to raise awareness of the impact of Covid -19 on the environment.

They were joined by over 100 other delegates and spent their time focusing on how the pandemic has affected the eco-system, particularly in other countries.

During the event, students even received a special message from Manchester United legend Denis Irwin, who recorded a video calling on everyone to

work together to tackle the climate crisis.

Art Comp Draws In The Votes


Some of our GCSE Art students put their talents to the test as they entered the United Learning International Art Competition.

Their pieces, entitled 'Contemplation', 'Melancholy', 'Difference is Beauty', 'Segments of Loss', 'Faded' and 'Feminism' were showcased on Facebook and Instagram, and likes were counted as public votes, which made up a percentage of the overall score. Our students' work gained thousands of likes across both platforms and received beautiful comments and praise.

British Science Week


British Science Week gave us a glimpse of what the future could look like as we celebrated it across school at the start of March.

This year's theme was "innovating for the future" and students had the opportunity to take part in tasks and competitions to practise their own creative skills!

Students got involved in the BSW poster competition, creating fantastic designs that showed what innovation means. Our Science

Department also organised two additional competitions at the Academy. The first, inspired by Back to the Future 2, was to make predictions about what the world will be like in 2040. Student prophecies included the discovery of alien races, time machines, engineless cars and even living on different planets! They were also encouraged to create their own Rube Goldberg machine, with a prize for the most successful one. At the end of the week, Head of Science Mr Campbell hosted a special assembly that included an exciting experiment for students to watch.

Mr Campbell said: "The past twelve months have highlighted the impact of Science on our lives like never before. As ever, our students have been really engaged with British Science Week and it's been great to hear their enthusiasm and ideas to help create a better future."



Action For Young Carers

Our Young Carers were honoured in school as part of National Young Carers Action Day.

The annual campaign is organised by the Carers Trust, recognising the efforts of young people who help to look after someone in their family or a friend who might be ill, frail, disabled, or have a mental health condition or addiction.



A skill activity worksheet was sent out to all known young carers to complete and submit, noting the skills they are most proud to have developed during lockdown, which included qualities such as empathy

and becoming a positive role model.

Meanwhile, students throughout school have

been invited to enter a Young Carer they know into a prize draw to win shopping vouchers by nominating them via student services and explaining how and why they think they're doing an amazing job.

Young Carers Lead Ms Shonick said: "We are so proud of all our Young Carers here at Stockport Academy, especially through recent times. They are amazing individuals and this is a brilliant opportunity to celebrate them.

"We have good links with Signpost Young Carers Service in Stockport which is a really fun and friendly service that all Young Carers can use for help or advice or as a place to meet others, albeit virtually at the minute. All you have to do is ask or be referred."

Welcome To The Family!


In March we were delighted to offer places to over 200 Year 6 students who will be starting secondary school with us in September.
